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OUR MISSION

Supplies Over Seas (SOS) meets **critical** healthcare needs in developing countries around the world by **recovering** and **redistributing** surplus medical supplies and equipment. SOS promotes **environmental stewardship**, partnering with hospitals and others to recover and send what would otherwise go to the landfill.

OUR VISION

To be a **first class regional medical surplus recovery organization**, promoting global health, environmental stewardship, and community awareness. SOS will do this through the efficient recovery, processing, and responsible redistribution of medical supplies and equipment to improve healthcare for the poor and underserved worldwide.

OUR COMMUNITY

SOS **relies** on the **generosity** of donors, volunteers, and friends; it receives no government funding, and accomplishes its **big** mission with a very **small** staff. SOS directly benefits **underserved people** living in **medically impoverished** communities abroad and at home by delivering necessary medical supplies and equipment to health clinics, hospitals, and other institutions. SOS matchs surplus with need, connecting communities, and delivering a **world** of **health** and **hope**.

Container Shipment Program

SOS ships 40-foot cargo containers filled with medical supplies and equipment to hospitals and clinics around the world. Containers on average hold 6 to 8 tons of supplies and equipment conservatively valued at \$150,000 - \$350,000. The donation requested for a full, 40-foot seagoing container is \$12,500. The initiating organization is responsible for arranging and paying for shipment.

SUPPLIES OVERSEAS

Honduras

Louisville-based **Safai Coffee** owner Mike Safai travels to coffee growing regions around the world and builds direct relationships with coffee farmers. On a recent coffee buying trip to Honduras, Mike visited the local clinic, Simon Contreras, and saw first-hand the obstacles facing the people of Marcala.

There were almost no basic medical supplies, and although the clinic serves 90,000 people there were only two beds in the emergency room. They simply were not equipped to serve so many patients.

Mike, and his wife Medora, decided to do what they could to improve the healthcare conditions for the coffee farmers and their families in the region.

In October a 40-foot container with 19,104 pounds of medical supplies and equipment was shipped to the clinic. Major equipment included 20 hospital beds; 2 labor & delivery beds; 4 infant warmers; 4 bassinettes; 4 exam



tables; and 2 new-mother chairs. They were particularly excited about the new -mother chairs, to replace the worn and broken ones they had.

A variety of small equipment included everything from vital sign and fetal monitors to ECG machines and exam lights. Walkers, wheelchairs and pallets of medical supplies completed the shipment.

"We are so proud to have completed this project with the direct efforts of our corporate partners as well as many individuals right here at home. Our passion for assisting our coffee farming families and their communities has fueled our success," said Mike Safai.



Serbia

In February, we loaded another container, this one bound for Serbia, in Eastern Europe. The shipment was made possible through a partnership with Indianapolis-based, **TriMedx Foundation** and the Chicago office of the **Lifeline Humanitarian**

office of the Lifeline Humanitarian Organization, whose patron is HRH Crown Princess Katherine.

Her request was for 46 hospital beds to upgrade hospitals and clinics in Belgrade that serve children who are mentally or physically disabled; orphaned, abused, or displaced; and the elderly. Through our generous Medical Recycling Partners across Kentucky and southern Ohio, we were able to send donated top-of-the-line hospital quality beds.

In her thank you letter, Princess Katherine said, "On behalf of all those who will benefit

from your incredible generosity, I warmly thank you for your wonderful kindness and readiness to help."

Afterwards, she also recorded a video to thank SOS and its donors personally. The video was shown at our first Health & Hope Breakfast in October (see p. 8).

Haiti

In August SOS loaded a container bound for the Bishop Joseph M. Sullivan Center for Health (BJSH) in Côtes-de-Fer, Haiti. New York-based **Catholic Medical Missions Board** was building the center and sent a request for medical supplies to Catholic Health Initiatives (CHI) in Denver.

Our Medical Recycling Partner **KentuckyOne Health** is a subsidiary of CHI, and they responded to the request, coordinating and overseeing the logistics to gather the needed supplies and equipment.

Thanks to our volunteers, donors, and Medical Recycling Partners, the container

was loaded with more than 12,000 pounds of requested medical surplus valued at over \$149,000.





Sierra Leone

In July a container shipped to **The Shepherd's Hospice** in Freetown, Sierra Leone on the west coast of Africa. The hospice provides care for some 3,200 patients a year.

"Through the joint efforts of Hosparus and SOS we are so grateful to be able to support a hospice in Sierra Leone that has been challenged by the HIV/ AIDs crisis and the Ebola virus," stated **Hosparus President & CEO Phil Marshall**.

"Several years ago, a team of **Hosparus** staff members visited Shepherd's Hospice, and that trip had a major impact on them and all of the employees at Hosparus. Each year our staff generously gives to Shepherd's Hospice through payroll deduction and will continue to do so to assist with the vital work that is being done for the people in Sierra Leone."

In October, we received a message that the container had been received: "Grateful to all our friends who made donations & worked towards the sending out of this life-changing donation. ...its quality of equipment is magnificent. I am humbled by this vote of trust & support... Many regards," from Gabriel Madiye, Director.















Custom Pallet Program

projects, or for clinics and hospitals abroad in need of supplies, SOS offers custom-packed shipments.

Depending on its contents, each pallet typically holds \$5,000 - \$15,000 worth of medical supplies and equipment.

A donation of \$625 per pallet is requested. The initiating organization is responsible for arranging the shipment and paying shipping costs.

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Custom Box Program

For those who cannot visit the SOS Medical Team "Store" to assemble a hand-carry, SOS packs and ships custom boxes. SOS requests a \$100 donation for supplies up to 50 pounds, and an additional \$2 per pound beyond the first 50 pounds.

Uganda

It's interesting how SOS gets connected to people all over the world – and it's not always just because of the Internet.

In February SOS sent 2 pallets to **Kampala**, **Uganda** for **Ray of Hope Medical Center** there. The pallets were sponsored by **Terri Clark Ministries**, based in Arkansas. Terri (pictured below) found SOS through **Sister Rose Mary Rexing**, in Jasper, Indiana.

The two clinics in Kampala serve 200 patients a month, and their major health concerns are malaria, typhoid, and adequate prenatal care. Good used equipment and supplies,



donated mostly from hospitals in Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio, are now helping meet those needs.

Sometimes big blessings travel in small quantities!



Bahamas

Students in the **Bellarmine Biology Club**, along with **Dr. David Porta** and members of the late **Dr. Tom Bennett's** family, worked with SOS last July to send a "Pallet of Health & Hope" to the **San Salvador Community Clinic** in Dr. Bennett's memory.

In 2015 Dr. Bennett had spent 22 hours in the small clinic after he fell and broke his hip. He was there for an annual spring break course on tropical marine biology that he and Dr. Jim Dyar had been teaching since the late 1970s.

Dr. Bennett had a huge influence on the Bellarmine community during his 36-year career. Items for the pallet were collected and packed by Bellarmine students and members of the Bennett family, from Dr. Bennett's wife, Barbara, to their grandchildren.



Their wonderful humanitarian aid effort, in memory of a beloved professor, is still providing aid and comfort to a community with few resources.





Hand Carry Program

SOS's **Hand Carry Program** allows medical relief workers undertaking short-term work abroad to visit SOS's

Medical Team "Store" to collect needed supplies and equipment that can be carried with them in their luggage. A donation of \$50 is requested for the first 50 pounds of supplies and equipment, and an additional donation of \$2 per pound is requested for any supplies and equipment beyond the first 50 pounds.

Tanzania

In February 2016, **Dr. Charity S. Burke**, a Louisville orthopaedic hand surgeon, traveled to Africa where she worked at the **Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Center** in Moshi, Tanzania.

Before departing, Dr. Burke visited the SOS Medical Team Store and gathered 164 pounds of medical supplies and instruments to treat orthopaedic trauma patients.

Until this trip, Dr. Burke had not been aware of SOS and its mission.

Following her trip, Dr. Burke said, "Someone recognized what was thought to be waste in the United States had value elsewhere. Someone took the time to collect these supplies from hospitals and sort this abundance of 'waste' into piles.

"Someone stored these supplies in an organized manner so that I could come and collect much needed supplies for my trip and celebrate, because without someone doing each of these steps, I know that such supplies would otherwise be thrown away.

"Plates, screws, clamps, micro instruments, and retractors packed in two large, extremely heavy suitcases made the trip smoothly halfway around the globe to Africa.

"With the help of Supplies Over Seas, there are now orthopaedic surgeons working in Moshi who are not only administering life-saving care, but who are also teaching the next generation of orthopaedic surgeons in Africa."





Medical Team "Store"

Fondly referred to as a store, it is actually a unique collection of medical instruments and small items that are made available to individuals and groups that are traveling for short-term medical mission trips. These are items that would fit in a suitcase or duffle bag, and medical teams often carry extra luggage of these items and leave them behind for the clinics and hospitals where they performed their work.

SOS does not sell its donated medical surplus but we do request donations to help cover our costs of gathering, sorting, storing and processing items for distribution; just as we do for the containers, pallets and boxes we ship.



A donation of \$50 for the first 50 pounds is requested, regardless of the value of the instruments or other items, which can often be worth hundreds of dollars. Over 50 pounds, a donation of \$2 per pound is requested.

We love to see a nurse or doctor's eyes light up when they walk in and see unexpected and coveted items they can select for the particular surgeries or treatments they plan to perform – cleft palates, burns, orthopaedics. Such items for their specialties are often there.



Local Impact



Nothing gets thrown away or recycled if we can possibly find another use or another home for it.

Some expired medical supplies can be repurposed to provide non-sterile medical care and some cannot. To give those items another life and a new home, SOS shares them with area medical schools, nursing schools, local animal shelters and clinics, and the like.

Personal hygiene and other items cannot be put into our inventory of medical surplus, but they can be shared with local nonprofits that need them.

In September, SOS opened its doors to area nonprofits and was able to give away more than 3,500 pounds of surplus items that had been donated!

"The expired supplies I receive from SOS save me thousands of dollars a year. I was buying these items straight from a distributor for \$1.70 apiece. Now I can use my budget on other areas of the classroom."
