From the Chair and CEO



Supplies Over Seas achieved several major milestones in 2018 including celebrating our **25th anniversary!** We became the sixth accredited Medical Surplus Recovery Organization (MSRO) in the U.S., we expanded our hospital network in Cincinnati and added our first hospital partner in Tennessee. Locally, we led a community-wide disaster relief effort for Houston after Hurricane Harvey and sent a shipment to Puerto Rico after Maria.

We are filled with gratitude to all who have been instrumental in bringing SOS to where it is today. This also marks the perfect time to envision SOS in the next quarter-century. No longer are we just an MSRO but rather a global health organization with the opportunity to deepen and broaden our impact.

Our commitment is to responsible global health donations that truly help drive positive change. That led us to expand our assessment of health related needs in the communities we serve; we now proactively engage partners that address needs for **safe water, sanitation and food**. Our first "comprehensive health container" that included food and water assets went to Niger, with more to come.

Over these 25 years, SOS has diverted some 3.5 million pounds of surplus from our landfills and shipped them to medically impoverished communities in 105 countries. Laudable to be sure, but we know that behind every pound collected and shipped there is a child, or parent, or someone whose life has been positively impacted. Nine year old **Thomas** in Nigeria had his sight restored and was able to return to school. **Angelina** in Zimbabwe had a bed and medical care to safely deliver her baby. **Maria**, 13, in Ecuador, had her broken leg set, preventing a lifelong limp.

There are many more Thomases, Angelinas and Marias that need our help. Please join us as we embark on our next quarter-century. Together we can deliver a brighter future for children and their families here at home and around the globe.

OUR MISSION

Supplies Over Seas improves **global health** and the **environment** through **recovery** and **redistribution** of surplus medical supplies.

OUR VISION

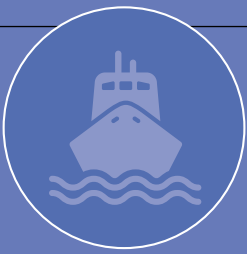

OUR COMMUNITY

SOS relies on the generosity of donors, volunteers, and friends; it receives no government funding, and accomplishes its big mission with a very small staff. SOS directly benefits underserved peoples living in medically impoverished communities at home and abroad by delivering necessary medical supplies and equipment to health clinics, hospitals, and other institutions.

95% of the donated materials SOS receives are donated, repurposed, or recycled.

SOS supplies match surplus with need, connecting communities, and delivering a **world of health and hope**.



Container Shipment Program

SOS ships **40-foot cargo** containers filled with medical supplies and equipment to hospitals and clinics around the world. Containers on average hold 6 to 8 tons of supplies and equipment conservatively valued at \$150,000 - \$350,000. The donation requested for a full, 40-foot seagoing container is \$9,500. The initiating organization is responsible for arranging and paying for shipment.

Ghana Eye Clinic

Genetic cataracts can affect people of all ages including children. Ghana is one of the countries most impacted, where over 700,000 are blind or visually impaired. The condition can be corrected with proper medical treatment.

In June 2018, **Friends Eye Center in Tamale, Ghana** received a container-load of medical supplies and equipment, worth \$203,000, to address this critical situation. Ophthalmologist and project coordinator Dr. Seth Wanye said, "We could not provide these surgeries to people in need without the supplies from SOS."

The project had its beginnings with 13-year old **Jordan Goldberg** in relation to his bar mitzvah. As momentum for the project grew, so did the participation of others. World Sight joined in, and then a grant from the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth completed the necessary funding.



A DEEPER GLOBAL HEALTH IMPACT

New Initiative Begins in Niger

SOS has long recognized that in the countries we serve there are other critical needs beyond what medical surplus can fill. We have begun to assess the broader scope of needs in the communities that request our aid.

Malnutrition and lack of safe water and disinfectant in these regions are beyond what SOS can address alone. With the strong relationships we have developed with other local nonprofits, we

have reached out to them to coordinate a more comprehensive, more effective response.

Niger is one of the poorest countries in Africa and is in desperate need of humanitarian aid. Early in the year, three visitors came to SOS to learn about our mission and how we might work together to assist Niger. We connected them with other local nonprofits with the appropriate resources.

Thanks to **Love the Hungry** and **WaterStep**, our first container to Niger included pallets of

fortified rice, chlorinators and bleach-makers along with our medical supplies. Multiple humanitarian containers will continue to ship during the coming year.



Dominican Republic

Caribbean Health Assistance, Rehabilitation and Management (C.H.A.R.M.) is an Ohio-based non-profit organization that takes teams of volunteers to the Dominican Republic.

Each October, 20-35 volunteers travel to the DR, where they conduct physical and dental exams, repair/remodel school buildings and hospitals, support an orphanage, distribute layette kits to expectant mothers and school and hygiene kits to children.

Director **Ron Booth** (right) visited SOS, and in June we shipped a container of medical supplies

and equipment to the DR, co-sponsored by C.H.A.R.M. and **Children of the Nations**. Loaded with medical equipment, crutches and canes, walkers and wheelchairs, school supplies, and even a dental chair and X-ray machine – these items were all donated by regional hospitals and other SOS recycling partners.

The container also included 10 pallets of Nutri-Plenty™ meals from our partner **Love the Hungry**; these are nutrient-rich meals of rice and other ingredients for malnourished children, packed by volunteers in Louisville.





Custom Pallet Program

For groups planning large-scale projects, or for clinics and hospitals abroad in need of supplies, SOS offers **custom-packed shipments**. Depending on its contents, each pallet typically holds \$5,000 - \$15,000 worth of medical supplies. A donation of \$2,500 per pallet is requested. The initiating organization is responsible for arranging the shipment and paying shipping costs.

Smaller Shipments

Wooden pallets with cartons of medical supplies, carefully stacked and shrink-wrapped, can be shipped separately when a full container is not needed.

From Gabon on the west coast of Africa to Tanzania on the southeast; from the Caribbean island of Haiti to the Central American coast in Belize; nearly \$15,000 worth of donated medical surplus sent on pallets last year is right now helping to treat and heal suffering people.



If you want to help a community in need, you don't have to sponsor a 40-foot container or go on a two-week mission trip. There are opportunities to become involved in smaller ways, and the organizations and mission teams that come to SOS for equipment and supplies would be grateful to be matched with a sponsor at any level of support.



Medical Team Store

Fondly referred to as a store, it is actually a unique collection of medical instruments and small items that are made available to individuals and groups that are traveling for short-term medical mission trips. These are items that would fit in a suitcase or duffle bag, and medical teams often carry extra luggage of these items and leave them behind for the clinics and hospitals where they performed their work.

SOS does not sell its donated medical surplus but we do request donations to help cover our costs of gathering, sorting, storing and processing items for distribution; just as we do for the containers, pallets and boxes we ship.

We love to see nurses' or doctors' eyes light up when they walk in and see unexpected and

coveted items they can select for the particular surgeries or treatments they plan to perform – cleft palates, burns, wounds, orthopaedics and more.





Hand Carry Program

SOS's **Hand Carry Program** allows medical relief workers undertaking short-term work abroad to visit the **Medical Team "Store"** to collect needed supplies and equipment that can be carried with them in their luggage. A donation of \$100 is requested for the first 50 pounds of supplies and equipment, and an additional \$2 per pound beyond the first 50 pounds.

Kenya

John Willingham and **Dr. Ellen Ballard** (below), along with their team, have been carrying SOS supplies and small equipment with them on every trip to Kenya for the past five years. The Oyugis community is in the poorest province, where incomes are \$50 to \$100 a year compared to \$465 for the rest of the country. Disease is rampant, with malaria, TB, AIDS, and waterborne illnesses; many children are orphans.

John began with a farming project to improve crop yields, feed malnourished children, and establish a co-op that would help them generate income and become self-sufficient. Ellen and other medical team members worked on setting up a clinic with SOS supplies in a rehabbed building. On one trip they brought a microscope for the part-time male nurse, who now sees patients and delivers babies.

Last year 90 mission teams and organizations took hand carry donations to Asia, Africa, Central and South America – from Belize and Cambodia to and Sierra Leone and Zimbabwe.



Custom Box Program

For those who cannot visit the **SOS Medical Team "Store"** to assemble a hand-carry, SOS packs and ships custom boxes. SOS requests a \$150 donation for supplies up to 50 pounds, and an additional \$2 per pound beyond the first 50 pounds.

Other Destinations

In some cases it is not practical or cost-effective for individuals and teams to travel to Louisville. In those cases, SOS staff and volunteers are happy to select and custom pack what they request for a trip or local project. It can be shipped to their starting point or to their destination, depending on their needs.

Last year SOS shipped 24 such orders, most of them headed to Central or South America, the Caribbean, or points in Africa. Below, Denise Sears delivering supplies in Nigeria, and Dr. Pawelos pointing to Swaziland, where his custom box shipment will go.

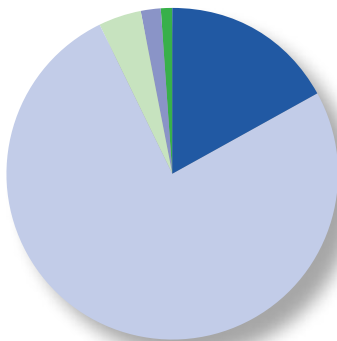

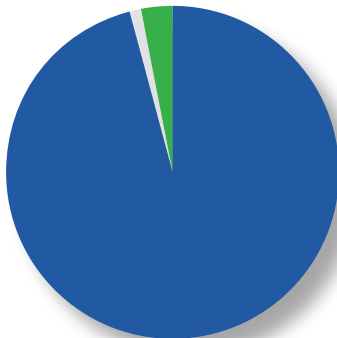

Local Impact

Nothing gets thrown away or recycled if we can possibly find another use or home for it. SOS periodically opens its doors to area nonprofits to come and take what they can use – free of charge.

What cannot be used in medical care SOS donates to area medical schools, nursing schools, local animal shelters and clinics. Liquids and other items that cannot be put into our inventory are shared with local nonprofits that need them.

In 2018 we joined the city's response to the devastating spring floods and outbreak of Hepatitis A. SOS donated gloves, masks, isolation gowns and clean-up disinfectant to the Red Cross and Louisville Metro Government to help with post-flood cleanup. Then 3,000 latex-free gloves were provided to the Health Department for its Hepatitis A vaccination program. We also led a Louisville community response to collect and ship needed items to Houston after Hurricane Harvey.

Increasing Our Regional Impact

The commitment our hospital partners demonstrate to environmental stewardship and global health is very gratifying, but we know there is more work to do. Here are a few highlights:

- SOS and several of our hospital systems have formed working committees to advance the environmental and humanitarian impact of our partnerships.
- SOS has been actively engaged in expanding its hospital network. We have a new hospital system partner in Nashville, Tennessee, St. Thomas Health, our first in the state, and expanding in Cincinnati.
- In addition to regular monthly hospital medical surplus collections, we worked with three retiring physicians and

a bio-med manufacturer to divert an extra 3,000 pounds of equipment from being discarded in the landfill.

- We are very grateful to UPS for their annual support through in-kind transportation, which makes our geographic growth possible.
- As an accredited MSRO – Medical Surplus Recovery Organization – we are one of only six in the U.S. Our reputation for upholding the highest standard of excellence continues to grow.
